# The Congressional Quarterly Almanac

In 1984, concerns about alcohol-related traffic fatalities led to a controversial amendment to HR 4616 effectively raised the drinking age for all states, withholding federal highway funds from states where the MLDA was under 21. ### **National Highway Traffic Safety Administration**

The NHTSA estimates that minimum drinking age laws have reduced traffic fatalities involving drivers under 21 by 13%, saving 25,509 lives since 1975. http://www-nrd.nhtsa.dot.gov/pubs/810817.pdf.

In 2007, alcohol related fatalities involving drivers under 21 accounted for 14% of total alcohol related traffic fatalities. Check out reports at:

### **Quick Stats: Binge Drinking**

Binge drinking is defined as "patterns of behavior that brings a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) to 0.08 grams percent or above. . . the proportion of current drinkers that binge is highest in the 18- to 20-year-old group (51%)".
