Encyclopedia Britannica online:

Oxford English Dictionary online:

The definitive source for definitions and derivations in the English Language. On campus, go to http://www.oed.com -- off campus, find it on our Research Resources page.

Quotations Books:

Need a sound bite for your paper? Quotations books can be found in the **Reference Section**, Level C, call number **808.88**

Foreign Language Dictionaries

 Both academic & general articles; some full text. [Limit to academic sources, if you like.]
- Lexis-Nexis:

Primarily newspaper and press feed articles, full text.
